Wiring Did Not Start Fire.

In the account of the J. R. Wil liamson fire in last weeks issue, the cause of the fire was given as "defective wiring." At that time the writer had not viewed the scene of the fire and explanation was based upon the opinion of one of the early arrivals at the fire. Later we visited the place of the fire and have no hesitancy in stating that the fire did not start from the electric wiring at all, but on the contrary started at the floor in the corner of the room where the siding was burned through in places and evidently followed the lattice shades upward doing but little burning where the electric light wires came into the building. As to the real cause of the fire, no one seems able to account, but without doubt it started at the floor and not the ceiling.
